Code of Conduct

Purpose

This code of conduct is intended to facilitate respectful and productive community conversations at public events and workshops. Participants who violate the conduct will be removed from the workshop.

Community Guidelines

Listen. Listen intently and without judgment so we may learn from one another's experiences and perspectives, even if they differ from our own. Do not interrupt others when they are talking.

Share the air. Take a step back if you are dominating the conversation and share responsibility for including all voices in the discussion.

Treat others with respect and dignity. Treat people as having intrinsic value and allow them to maintain their sense of worth and well-being. Don't make assumptions about how people want to be addressed.

Show empathy. Demonstrate the ability to recognize and respect how someone feels. No hate speech, discrimination, harassment or violence of any kind will be tolerated.

Be present. Focus on the conversation at hand. Use of videography or audio recording devices—particularly during group discussions—is strongly discouraged as it can make fellow participants feel uncomfortable.

Code of Conduct

Prohibited Behaviors

The following behaviors will not be tolerated and will result in the immediate removal of the participant from the event:

Harassment and Discrimination

- Verbal abuse, slurs, or derogatory comments
- Discrimination based on race, color, religion, national origin, age, disability, gender, sexual orientation, or any protected status
- Intimidation or threatening behavior

Disruptive Conduct

- Preventing others from speaking or participating
- Sustained interruption of presentations or discussions
- Refusing to follow facilitator instructions
- Using amplified devices without authorization
- Deliberately exceeding allocated speaking time after warnings
- Any other conduct intended to disrupt the event

Physical Misconduct

- Any form of physical violence or threatening gestures
- Intentional physical contact without consent
- Damaging or defacing venue property or any workshop materials

Other Prohibited Actions

- Bringing weapons or dangerous materials to events
- Deliberately spreading misinformation to disrupt proceedings

New York City DOT reserves the right to determine whether any action violates the rules above. NYCDOT also reserves the right to end the meeting at any point to ensure safety of staff and attendees.








Project Goals

7-mile <u>continuous</u> greenway

- Create a continuous and connected path for cyclists, pedestrians, runners, and others
- New transportation option both for recreation and commuting
- Connect people to the waterfront and parks
- Provide convenient and safe connections to greenway paths from the local street network.




What is a Greenway?

GREEN


- Continuity is key
- Used for both transportation and recreation
- Used by cyclists and pedestrians, among others
- Often along natural and man-made linear spaces (rail/ highway rights-of-way, rivers, waterfronts, and parks)

Quick-build projects: use DOT in-house resources, build momentum





Long-term projects: Tackle key sections with capital projects



Selected Route


Spring 2024 workshops focused largely on on-street routes and yielded clear preferences.

In almost all cases, the preference was for the closest continuous street to the water:


- Bailey Ave

Proposed Projects

On-Street Projects (13)

- NYC DOT-owned roadways
- Includes both near-term and long-term configurations
- Complemented by connectors which provide access from the waterfront into the rest of the network, often perpendicular to main greenway alignment




1. Van Cortlandt Park Connection

From I-87 Exit 11 Off-Ramp to Van Cortlandt Park South













Selection rationale

- Connection to southern terminus of Tibbetts Brook project (at 230th St)





From Fordham Rd to Tremont Ave








5. Sedgwick Central Corridor Improvements

From Tremont Ave to Depot PI










Selection rationale


6. Sedgwick South Corridor Improvements

From Depot PI to Jerome Ave












Selection rationale

- Connections to waterfront access at Depot PI






From Jerome Ave to Bronx Terminal Market




- Opportunity to improve difficult intersections

 Dam Bridge





From 138th St to 161st St




- Provide

Extensive coordination required with MTA Metro-North, NYSDOT, and US Coast Guard







Selection rationale

- Access to Mill Pond Park, Bronx Children's Museum, Hop Hop Musuem




9. Exterior St South Corridor Improvements

From 145th St Bridge to Madison Ave Bridge










Selection rationale

- Access to Lower Concourse Park (Opening Fall 2025)










10. E 135th St Corridor Improvements

From Madison Ave Bridge to Third Avenue Bridge














- New residential development planned






From Third Ave to Bruckner Blvd
















12. Bruckner Blvd Corridor Improvements


From Lincoln Ave to E 133rd St









G. Harlem River Yards Waterfront Path





